COSS DIALOGUE LECTURE

Of Ghosts and Ghost Writers: How the History of Sociology Complicates our Understanding of Critical Race Theory and the 'War on Woke'

Dr. Zine Magubane, Professor of Sociology, Boston College

Before he became famous as founder of the 'Chicago School' of Sociology, which was at the forefront of establishing 'race relations' as a key subfield of 'scientific' sociology, Robert E. Park worked as a 'ghostwriter' for Booker T. Washington. This paper will argue that many of the key assumptions that undergird 'Racial Realism'—one of the key tenets of Critical Race Theory—bear an unknown and therefore unacknowledged debt to this relationship. As such, the relationship between Robert E. Park and Booker T. Washington can be understood as a kind of 'ghost' that haunts Critical Race Theory.

Understanding this hidden history is particularly critical in our contemporary moment. For many activists on the right, sociology has become virtually indistinguishable from Critical Race Theory and all of its imagined ills. Indeed, the discipline of sociology has become a lightning rod in the 'war on woke'. In January 2024, Florida eliminated sociology as a core course at its universities. In defense of the action, Florida's education commissioner wrote that sociology had been 'hijacked' by left wing activists. The American Sociological Association responded with a statement that defended sociology by stating that: "This decision... is a gross misunderstanding of sociology as an illegitimate discipline driven by 'radical' and 'woke' ideology. To the contrary, sociology is the scientific study of social life." This paper will further explain how the history of sociology in the United States—particularly its efforts to establish its identity as a 'true science'—is intertwined with the aforementioned relationship between Park and Washington and, thus, adds yet another layer of complexity to the narrative on Critical Race Theory and its connection to sociology, both for its detractors and its defenders.
